## MAJ John Shay Chaplain Corps, United States Army

Chaplain John Shay was born and raised in Eastern South Dakota. While John was in high school, his oldest brother took him to a Wesleyan Church where he learned of his own sin, his need for forgiveness, and the sacrifice of Jesus Christ.
